Whats New in K-2

Another busy week in K2, with everyone working hard to do their very best every day.

Year 2 have been focusing on making their writing interesting by tightening tension in their stories. Kindergarten have been learning to write on lines and working hard to make sure they start their letters in the correct place. Everyone is focused on paying attention to punctuation when they are reading to ensure the story makes sense. Our book this week is "How to Catch a Star" by Oliver Jeffers. The story is about a little boy who comes up with many different plans to catch his very own star. We have been finding many noun groups in the story. They help to make the reader get a picture in their head of what is happening.

In Mathematics we are learning about length and using direct comparison to work out what is bigger or smaller. We have been making and using rulers with centimetres and meters and deciding what is the most efficient way to measure large and small items.

5/6 had a fantastic time on Friday at the STEM Day. They joined in with the other schools, asked questions, answered questions, helped younger children, and did everything they were asked beautifully. They also enjoyed their own private free time with all the scientific equipment. In English, we have finished joint writing our science fiction story and will be able to share it with you at assembly. We are now beginning to plan our own science fiction or fantasy stories. We are focusing on extending ourselves by writing about something less familiar.

In reading, we have read 'Matthias and the Dragon' working on our fluency, author's

intentions, and comprehension. We have also worked hard on identifying dependent and independent clauses in our reading and have a gained deeper understanding of complex sentences.

In Mathematics, we have revised decimals and converting units of measurement. We have also challenged ourselves to solve written word problems using the skills we have learnt.

We have been learning about Tsunamis in science and have enjoyed Ms Napper's fitness and sport lessons, although, we miss Mrs Nixon!

Remembrance Day

The 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month marks the moment the guns fell silent on the Western Front after the bloodshed of World War I. Over the past century, this moment has been adopted across the globe as a time to remember those who served and sacrificed in all wars and conflicts.

On the battlefields of the Western Front, in soil churned up by shelling and trenches, poppies were among the first flowers to bloom. For many, their scarlet petals echoed the bloodshed of the Great War and they became a powerful symbol of the loss of life the conflict represented.

It was a Canadian doctor, Major John McCrae, who penned the poem which first associated poppies with remembrance. Devastated by the death of a young soldier, Major McCrae wrote the poem during the second battle of Ypres in 1915.

His words are still read each year on Remembrance Day:

In Flanders fields the poppies blow Between the crosses, row on row, That mark our place; and in the sky The larks, still bravely singing, fly Scarce heard amid the guns below.

We are the Dead. Short days ago We lived, felt dawn, saw sunset glow, Loved and were loved, and now we lie, In Flanders fields.

Take up our quarrel with the foe: To you from failing hands we throw The torch; be yours to hold it high. If ye break faith with us who die We shall not sleep, though poppies grow In Flanders fields.
